

RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS...

eld RH6 9QJ

April sees the celebration of St George's Day on 23 April. As a child I remember it as one of the days that I climbed up the church tower, first with my father, who was Rector of the village we lived in, and then as I got a bit older, by myself, to hoist the flag of St George up the flagpole. It used to be flown on special days in the church's calendar, not only for days like Easter Day and Ascension Day, but also for St George, celebrating him as England's patron saint. As I got older St George seemed to be celebrated less, though in recent years he seems to have made something of a comeback. It seemed to begin with the greeting card industry and then the pubs, but celebrations of the day are still fairly muted, especially when compared to St Andrew in Scotland, St David in Wales, or St Patrick in Ireland.

There are a number of legends about St George, the most famous of course being the slaying of a dragon. Talk of dragons reminds me of a passage I

read by the poet Rainer Maria Rilke. Rilke was born in Prague in 1875 and died in Switzerland in 1929. He wrote a lot of poems and also a lot of letters, ten of which were to a young officer cadet called Franz Kappus who had written to him for advice on writing poetry. These were published in a book, appropriately called *Letters to a Young Poet*, and in one of the letters he wrote these words:

How can we forget those ancient myths found at the beginnings of all peoples? The myths about dragons who at the last moment turn into princesses? Perhaps all the dragons in our lives are princesses, only waiting for the day when they will see us handsome and brave. Perhaps everything terrifying is deep down something helpless that wants help from us. . . So dear Mr Kappus, you shouldn't be dismayed if a sadness rises up in front of you, greater than any you have ever seen before; or if a disquiet plays over your hands and over all your doings like light and cloud-shadow. You must think that something is happening with you, that life has not forgotten you, that it holds you in its hand; it will not let you fall. . . .

I think they are lovely words: *life has not forgotten you . . . it holds you in its hand.* They offer hope when we are in the darker and harder times of our lives, the winter times of our lives. They bring hope that spring will come – the hope that the month of April brings as the earth buds back into life and as the evenings lighten.

The thought is echoed in the words of the traditional Gaelic Blessing, which is what I shall leave you with this month. It also seems very appropriate for this month of April showers:

May the road rise up to meet you.

May the wind be always at your back.

May the sun shine warm upon your face;
the rains fall soft upon your fields
and until we meet again,
may God hold you in the palm of His hand.

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SMALLFIELD AND DISTRICT AVIATION GROUP

It was with deep regret that the Aviation Group heard of the sad death on 21st February of Copthorne resident Capt Eric 'Winkle' Brown, CBE, DSC, AFC RN who has been the Group's Honorary President ever since it was formed 20 years ago. Eric had become known as Britain's Greatest Pilot thanks to his Record Breaking exploits. With 427 different types he was the Guinness Book of Records holder of the greatest number of aircraft types flown as well as holder of the



most landings on an aircraft carrier, 2,271. Neither of these records is ever likely to be broken. He flew all the German WW2 aircraft including their jets and lethal rocket fighter and was involved in the capture and interrogation of senior Nazi officers as he was fluent in German and had met a number of them pre-war. In 1945 he became the first person to land a jet on an aircraft carrier and was also one of the UK's earliest helicopter pilots. After the war he tested a variety of British prototype aircraft, held a number of positions in the Navy and was the author of many books including his autobiography 'Wings on My Sleeve', the only way he could do justice to an enthralling aviation career, albeit tinged with sadness for lost comrades. We were privileged to have him as a speaker on many occasions, always to a packed room and as recently as mid-January he spoke at the Group's New Year lunch. He died in East Surrey Hospital after a short illness. Our thoughts are with his son Glen and companion Jean, his wife Lynn died in 1998. A minutes silence was held in his honour at the Group's recent meeting.



The Meeting on Tuesday 5th April at 7 pm in the Centenary Hall, will be 'The Canberra Low Level Squadron' by Fred Rivett. This unique Squadron flew a special version of the twin-engined bomber during the Cold War with crews trained in a toss-bombing technique for both conventional and nuclear weapons.

DO YOU RECYCLE TEXTILES?



Two thirds of Surrey residents don't realise underwear, socks and tights can be recycled.

Research has shown residents know they can recycle clothes and home textiles like sheets and towels. However, they are more likely to throw personal items and accessories like bags and belts in the bin, which is bad for the environment and expensive for the taxpayer.

In fact, last year in Surrey more than 10,500 tonnes of clothes and home texti les were thrown away which could have been reused or recycled .

All clothes and home textiles (except duvets and pillows) can be recycled, even if they're torn or tatty, but should be clean and dry. They're either sorted to be used again in the UK or abroad, or recycled into new products like felt, insulation or stuffing.

To start recycling your textiles, clothes and paired shoes, place them in a plastic carrier bag, tie the top and leave them next to your green food caddy for collection. You can also put them in any textile bin at recycling bank sites or the community recycling centres. For more information visit www.tandridge.gov.uk/recyclingandwaste.

If the thought of lugging heavy bags of grass clippings, plants, weeds, small branches, leaf fall and the like to the local tip seems like too much effort, there is a simple answer: join Tandridge's popular, affordable and efficient Green Waste Club. The Club collects garden waste every fortnight for recycling into compost.

Club membership starts from just £4.33 per month (plus a one-off £10 bin delivery fee), and there are a number of payment options and subscription periods available. Neighbours with small gardens can also share a membership, reducing the cost even further. In return, you'll receive a 240 litre wheeled bin which the Club's crew collect and empty every two weeks.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

At our meeting on March 8th, we had a most interesting talk from Ms. Pam Goodall, entitled "The Tesco Effect". Being the mother of young twin sons in the 1970s, Pam worked part-time as a tennis and squash coach, but felt the need of something more challlenging. She and a like-minded friend, who was bored with office work, noticed the Billingshurst Freezer Centre for sale and



decided they could make a better job of it than the then current owners. With some redecorating and bright posters showing what each freezer contained, the store soon attracted new customers. Extra stock items were added, such as bargain-sized packs of dry goods and plastic packaging materials. Some of the large closed chest freezers were replaced by opentopped ones to display contents and the name of the store was changed to "Igloo".

The store was very popular, but it was realised that many commuters were using their car park, leaving little room for shoppers, so it became necessary to charge for parking. In 1980, exceptionally heavy rain resulted in the store being flooded. Although much stock was lost, many of the large freezers escaped damage because the newly installed electric sockets were above the water level.

Soon after this, Pam and her friend decided to go their separate ways and sold the store. Pam took over a local drug store, but didn't do as well as she'd hoped because Tesco had opened up in Horsham and customers were buying medicines and toiletries there along with their groceries. At the time of the Great Gale in 1987, however, people were glad to come in for essentials as roads were blocked with fallen trees! When Tesco opened a huge superstore near Horsham, Pam decided to sell up. An Italian chef was keen to buy her premises to open a restaurant, but met with strong opposition from council members over "change of use". Thanks to Pam's tireless lobbying, the councillors changed their minds and the Italian chef was able to fulfill his dreams. Pam has subsequently lead a very exciting life, including cycling round the world!

There were lots of entries for this month's competition for "my prettiest cup and saucer". The winner was Sylvia Currie's delightful little cup shaped like an apple on a green leaf saucer.

THE WAY IT WAS No. 22 Evacuees: the second group

The evacuees from Brockley were very different from the first group. We think it was organised so that this group arrived after the Penge school were settled in and everyone had accepted the changes. Most of this latest group had never been outside their own immediate neighbourhood, never seen farm animals or large open spaces and fields. For these children it was an adventure and, for some of the enthusiastic families who offered to take in the young people, it was a long time remembered misadventure!

It didn't take this new influx long to find their way into everything, nothing was out of bounds, scrumping was a favourite, anything that grew on trees was free for the taking, even the Quince which were about the most bitter of all fruits. Gordon Fisher often told how they were trying milk one of the cows in his field.

Bill recalls that his near neighbours, Arthur Putt the Blacksmith and his wife, who were childless, housed 3 young brothers, twins and a single boy, all under 10. Within a short time the lady was distraught at trying to manage them. It was said that she doubted they had ever used knives and forks or had ever sat at a table, their toilet behaviours were nil, at night the corners of the room were as far as they went!

There was also a young sister, just 6 years of age, she was billeted with Bill's parents and within a secure separate room. Bill recalls that during the time she stayed at the house her sole aim was to entice him into her bed. Bill was 11 ... she was 6 ... All members of this family were soon removed to a different destination and not heard of again........

A much discussed yet un-proven story was that of a coloured girl, whose parents had anticipated their child being left to last when the distribution was taking place. After she was found accommodation, a 10 shilling note was revealed sewn inside her clothing as a gift for whoever accepted her. Ten Shillings at that time was a fare sum of money, probably near £300 in today's costs.

Bill recalls that his parents housed at least four different sets of young evacuees, two pairs of brothers, the first were orphans who after the war moved to Australia. The second were from Mitcham, plus a single boy and the young girl mentioned earlier. Even at the height of the blitz it was common for many parents to ask for their children to be returned home.

Bill recalls one girl staying almost next door who did return, but following another night of the blitz she went missing with all her family. Eventually the raids diminished and all the evacuees returned home. Other occupants then took their place in Bills house, first two Land Girls then a Canadian Nurse who worked for Sir Archibald McIndoe the burns specialist at East Grinstead. Bills mother like many ladies were always seeking to gain extra income.

Citation

Rowenna became a Rainbow aged 5 years and a Brownie aged 7. She was identified as a Sixer (Leader) aged eight, helping her peers. She later joined Cirl Guides aged 11 years and at the age of 12 years became a Pack Leader. Since the age of 12 she has spent the last 18 years dedicated to helping young children through various voluntary work and activities as a way of giving back to her community.

For the last six years she has managed a Guide Unit as an Assistant Guide Leader for the 2nd Copthorne - Central Sussex and is devoted to helping young children in their development in life and gets a great deal of personal satisfaction/reward from seeing children develop, learn new life skills and become confident in what they do. She runs a guide group weekly for 2 hours but invests a considerable amount of time (around 4 hours weekly) organising and]planning activities for the children. On top of this she also leads a weekly Beavers Unit for 1st Burstow - East Suney for 1 hour and a Cubs and Scouts Unit totalling 3 hours and investing even more of her time (around 6 hours per week) in the planning of activities for the children.

She is also responsible for running the Unit Centre and ensuring funds are raised to cover the overhead costs and upkeep of building. She has obtained "indoor night away and camp site night away permit" which has allowed her to hold quarterly weekend away camp for kids, which involved a lot of planning and organisation. In her spare time she also arranges fund raising activities such as jumble sales, quiz nights, raffles, cake sales and a rest stop for the London to Brighton bike ride to help with her responsibility for running of the Unit Centre to cover the overhead costs (£3,000.00 for guide centre and £6,000.00 for scout centre) and the upkeep of buildings as well as raise money to carry out activities for the children. These activities take around 210 hours per year. One of the children in her group is autistic and she has ensured this child is included in activities and gets the help and attention required. She encourages others to get involved from asking parents of children to donate some time and looks at future leaders from the brownies from an early age. Her drive is to see children happy and enjoying life, as well as them achieving personal goal from climbing wall to receiving awards.

In 2000 she went to Ukraine to demonstrate Girl Guiding where it had been banned for the last 80 years, isharing guiding traditions and experiences. Following this experience she helped to raise funds of £12,000.00 over a year (taking approx 2 hour per week) for 40 Ukrainian women and girls to come to the UK and visit historic sites of where Guiding began and share cultures.


POEM FOR SPRING

(it may be next month when you write it but it won't be when readers see it), but rather write, for example, "At our April meeting...".
